BOOK REVIEW

The Last Stand of Fox Company : Award-winning authors Bob Drury and Tom Clavin take us about as close as we'll ever want to be to the subzero action in November 1950 north of the 38th Parallel in Korea. Fox Company, Seventh Marine Regiment, is deployed on a hill east of the Main Supply Route (MSR) that snakes south from Chosin Reservoir. Their mission is to keep the MSR open to accommodate the movement south of U.S. units that are fighting a rear-guard action against a tsunami of Chinese regular army troops—ten divisions pouring south from the Yalu River.

Temperatures of thirty below zero have turned the ground to concrete and made blocks of ice out of C-rations. For over a month, the 240 Marines of Fox Company hold off night assaults by Chinese units four times their numbers, dropping their functioning complement by three-quarters. Instead of sandbags, Fox Company Marines use the frozen bodies of enemy soldiers as fighting hole fortifications. This is a high-paced compelling piece of writing punched up by

personal narratives that not only will keep you turning the pages, but will infuse you with a deep admiration for the sheer grit, unit coherence, and fortitude of the Marines of Fox Company. You also may find yourself looking at Chevalier Sgt. Don Reid, a machine gunner with the First Marine Division, a little differently.
